DALLAS - The Bath House Cultural Center presents the 22nd annual *El Corazón* annual exhibition, a mixed media exhibition with works by local and regional artists featuring an eclectic collection of art inspired by the heart (El Corazón), an important and inspiring symbol in art. Jose Vargas, a Dallas Curator and visual artist, has organized the exhibition since its inception.

The symbol of the heart has taken center stage in the art galleries of the Bath House Cultural Center for more than two decades. The unceasing popularity of this exhibition is proof of the everlasting appeal and interest that the symbol is able to generate in the mind of countless artists. There never seems to be a shortage of artists who are lured by the multifaceted aspects of the heart. The heart stimulates the imagination of an artist in many ways and the goal of this exhibition is to share the fascinating ideas and concepts that informed the work of the participating artists.

The eclectic nature of the show engages the public in interesting ways. The viewer, for example, can admire a work of art that explores love in all its complex, and sometimes divergent, ways. Romantic fulfilled love is contrasted in the gallery with art

pieces that investigate unreciprocated love and disillusionment with the same level of intensity. In the exhibition, the heart also represents connections with personal identity and with a person's views on social and political issues. Regardless of their intention or direction, the featured works of art share a common link in that all of them were motivated by a strong and passionate desire to communicate a highly intimate story or idea that would have otherwise remained private had the artist not had a theme as revealing as the heart, and anything associated with it, as their inspiration.
